On 7 November, one week prior to Britain's own Brass in Concert Championship, its sister event, the US Open Brass Band Championship, was held in St. Charles, Illinois, a western suburb of Chicago. Like Brass in Concert, this event is an entertainment contest, unlike the majority of brass band events, which are based on the traditional test-piece format. After winning the US Open in 2008, Fountain City accepted the invitation to perform at the 2009 edition of Brass in Concert (the winner of Brass in Concert is similarly invited to perform at the following year's US Open). Upon returning home from the 2009 US Open, Musical Director, Joe Parisi, and the band finalised its preparations for an 18-day tour of Britain, which includes performances at the Gala Concert and contests at both Brass in Concert and the Scottish Open, as well as a recording session. During the tour, the members of Fountain City will be performing 25 separate works and, for the third year in a row, Fountain City Brass Band of Kansas City,

Missouri, will also be able to boast the title of US Open champion.

Also in keeping with the UK's Brass in Concert, Frank Renton, host of the BBC Radio 2 programme, Listen to the Band, introduced each band and offered commentary and facts about the music. Band members and the audience also had opportunities to visit several displays by various mouthpiece and brass instrument manufacturers, as well as perusing an immense display of brass band recordings for sale. In between the performances of the bands, soloists and ensemble buskers entertained the audience and appealed for the cash prize, which is collected in a top hat throughout the day from the audience. An anonymous judge, sitting somewhere in the audience, determined the winning busking performance and those performers were awarded the cash. Audience members were also able to give money to a specific busker or group by presenting an envelope with the name of the performer(s) to the front desk.

As an entertainment contest, the bands are free to move about the stage, use props and costumes, tell a story line, insert humour and do whatever they think is necessary to make their performance unique. This often involves the bands setting up different seating formations in between selections, or moving the chairs to the side and using the stage for various configurations or even dance steps. Despite the addition of the 'entertainment'

aspect, the music is still four times more important in the overall judgement. While each of the three adjudicators has a total of 125 points to work with, 100 of these are assigned to music and 25 are allowed for entertainment. Still, in a close contest, the entertainment element can make the difference, so bands continuously try to figure out what the judges consider to be entertaining. For example, the Weston Silver Band came to the USA from Toronto, Canada and, for the first time ever, encountered the entertainment format. Director, Larry Shields, stated that the next time the band came back to the festival, it will "prepare more movement and different setups of the ensemble." Michael J. Garasi of the second placed Brass Band of Central Florida added: "Since this is an entertainment contest, we're trying to figure out what's entertaining; is it visual or aurally entertaining?" Ultimately, what is 'entertaining' may very well be whatever the judges decide is entertaining on any particular day, depending on what side of the bed they wake up on. As Frank Renton said, "Entertainment can only be what it means to you. That's the responsibility of each adjudicator to figure that out." The striving of each band to be entertaining is

what gives this contest such a unique flavour and makes it so interesting for the audience. Next year's US Open Brass Band Championships will be held on 6 November. Check out www.usopenbrass.org for further information.
